Rachal had found what he was looking for and used the image that accompanied the story as the first Seawolf logo in 1977.

The simple flag of a last frontier.



HONORARY DEGREE AWARD

ALVIN AMASON

Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters

Accomplished artist and educator Alvin Amason (Sugpaiq/Alutiiq) was born and raised on Kodiak Island. He grew up slogging through alder thickets, following his grandfather, bear guide Eli Metrokin, up mountainsides, and hauling in salmon-filled nets as a deckhand. These early experiences and the island's cultural traditions inspire his art.



Continuing to create and exhibit his artwork, Amason remains influential in the art community. His work has been exhibited in collections around the world, including the Alutiiq Museum, Anchorage Museum, Institute of American Indian Art, the Boulogne-sur-Mer Museum in France, the Heard Museum in Phoenix, and the Smithsonian American Art Museum in Washington, D.C. Amason has also participated in international symposiums, sharing his expertise and passion for art.

In 1997, Amason was honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award by the Nature Conservancy of Alaska. In 2004, he received the Rasmuson Foundation's Individual Artist Fellowship. In 2018, he received the State of Alaska Governor's Award for Outstanding Visual Artist and the Rasmuson Foundation's Award for Distinguished Individual Artist. He has participated in several invitational exhibitions and his work has been featured in many publications.

Kodiak and his roots remain a central part of his life. He regularly returns for rest and inspiration, as well as to share his knowledge and support young artists. He has served as a board member for the Alaska State Council of the Arts, the Institute of Alaska Native Arts, and the Alaska Native Arts Foundation.

Amason's aesthetic and his reverence for the cultural practice of artmaking has made Alaska a richer place to live and work. As a trailblazer in the bridging of traditional and modern art, he has been instrumental in cultivating the idea of an Alaskan art movement.



HONORARY DEGREE AWARD

DIANE KAPLAN

Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters

For nearly 30 years, Diane Kaplan set the standard for philanthropic management and giving in Alaska, starting as the only employee of a \$5 million family foundation and growing it into the largest, most powerful philanthropy in the state with an estimated \$800 million in assets and grant-making totaling \$25-30 million annually. As president and CEO of the Rasmuson Foundation, Kaplan and her staff did not simply write checks to existing do-gooders; they identified holes in Alaska's social safety net and worked to fill them by developing support systems for the inexperienced, understaffed and under-funded.



Additionally, Kaplan ran point on a number of high-impact initiatives, including Pick. Click. Give., which most recently channeled more than \$3 million from individual Permanent Fund Dividend distributions to charity. She helped establish local foundations in communities across the state, and was a driving force behind a campaign to grow the assets of the Alaska Community Foundation to more than \$200 million. By establishing national philanthropic partnerships, Kaplan has attracted more than \$400 million in investments to Alaska projects. She engaged community members through listening sessions, formed Recover Alaska, a statewide effort to address alcohol-related issues, created a program that supports artists, and championed UAA's Alaska Native Science and Engineering Program in its growth over two decades.

Kaplan currently serves on numerous boards, including United States Artists and the Nudlaghi Leadership Institute. Her energy and commitment have earned her many awards including the Council on Foundations Distinguished Grantmaker Award, Alaska Federation of Natives Denali Award, the Anchorage Chamber of Commerce Athena Leadership Award, Commonwealth North's William A. Egan Distinguished Alaskan Award, and an Ally award from Tlingit Haida Central Council. Additionally, in 2022 she was awarded a residency at the Rockefeller Foundation's Lake Como Bellagio Center In Italy. Most recently, in 2023 President Joe Biden appointed her a director of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.

MERITORIOUS SERVICE AWARD

IRA PERMAN

Meritorious Service Award

Ira Perman is a dedicated professional with over four decades of experience in supporting the arts, humanities and community development in Alaska, embodying the spirit of selflessness and service.

As executive director of the Anchorage Concert Association for 20 years, Perman played a pivotal role in elevating the cultural experiences of countless Alaskans through exceptional music, dance and theater performances.



As president of the Alaska Humanities Forum, he championed the importance of humanities education and its impact on our society. His leadership brought about significant advancements in fostering critical thinking, cultural understanding and civic engagement within the community.

In his current role as executive director of the Atwood Foundation, he has continued to uplift the community through grants and scholarships for education and arts and journalism projects. Under his leadership, the organization has emerged as one of the largest local funders in the state, supporting organizations and individuals dedicated to cultural, educational and humanitarian causes — not the least of which is UAA.

Prior to joining the Atwood Foundation, Perman volunteered with the UAA Department of Theatre and Dance assisting with evening performances and stepping up to fill a variety of technical crew roles as needed. He continues to support and champion the arts at UAA, both personally and through his work with the foundation.

Perman's career is rich with volunteer and community service, having also served on committees and boards for the Institute of the North, Anchorage Rotary, Atwood Foundation, National Endowment for the Arts and the Association of Performing Arts Presenters.

His exceptional leadership, dedication to the arts and commitment to philanthropy have enriched the lives of Alaskans and left an enduring legacy.

MERITORIOUS SERVICE AWARD

CATHY RASMUSON

Meritorious Service Award

For 52 years, Cathy Rasmuson has demonstrated her love and commitment to Alaska through her generosity and community service. Since 1997, she has served on the board of directors of the Rasmuson Foundation, the mission of which is, "To promote a better life for Alaskans," and is something she embodies every day.





In 2017, Rasmuson was inducted into the Alaska Women's Hall of Fame, with a biography that highlights her belief in recognizing one's strengths and gifts to make the most of them. She possesses exceptional organizational and strategic thinking abilities, which have served her well in championing causes through her service on the Rasmuson Foundation and hosting numerous events, receptions and dinners for various organizations, including the Foraker Group and Sitka Fine Arts Camp.

Beyond her work with the foundation, Rasmuson has served as co-chair of the capital campaign for the Providence Cancer Center and was pivotal in establishing the Newborn Intensive Care Unit at Providence Alaska Children's Hospital. Additionally, she has supported Catholic Social Services and McAuley Moms.

Throughout her 35 years of service, Rasmuson has sat on numerous other boards, including Alaska Children's Services and Alaska Repertory Theatre. As Alison Kear, executive director of Covenant House Alaska, states, "Cathy tirelessly gives her time to her friends, to those in need and to the community. She is a selfless and powerful role model."

BARBARA KAHULA

Graduate Student Speaker

Suspicious ads on Craigslist don't usually lead to life-changing opportunities, but accounting alumna Barbara Kahula is the exception. After graduating from Wasilla High School, Kahula worked in a variety of finance jobs, always leaving for somewhere else after learning all she could from a position. Searching for her next opportunity, she responded to a vague Craigslist ad, ignoring the caution expressed by her husband. Fortunately, the ad led Kahula to a front desk position at accounting firm Laughlin, Ogle & Rodgers, LLC.



This wasn't Kahula's first encounter with accounting. In eighth grade, a certified public accountant by the name of Dan Kennedy came to her class to promote the field. She was inspired, excitedly telling her parents after school that she wanted to become a CPA when she grew up. When they cautioned her that it might not be the most interesting career, she tucked it away in the back of her mind. But after joining the firm, Kahula rediscovered how infinitely interesting accounting actually is.

"Every day is different and I'm always learning something new. I also love that I get to help people, because not everybody understands the language of accounting. So it's awesome when I can help somebody get rid of an IRS penalty or lower a tax bill, or even if I can help them understand why they owe taxes in the first place," she said.

Returning to her passion, Kahula's boss, John Rodgers, encouraged her to also return to school. A first-generation college student, she intended to only go for the associate degree in accounting, but proceeded to earn her bachelor's degree in accounting, an occupational endorsement certificate in bookkeeping, and finally a Master of Business Administration. While at UAA, Kahula was also introduced to like-minded students at the Accounting Club who shared her passion, as well as her mentors, professors Stacia Straley, Soren Orley and Teresa Stephenson.

"I'm astounded at how great the accounting community is at UAA. The professors go above and beyond to get students excited about accounting, which is a difficult task. I definitely wouldn't be getting my master's degree if I hadn't met so many awesome people in the accounting department," she said.

Kahula doesn't plan on taking a break anytime soon. Not only will she begin studying for her CPA exams, but as a member of the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma, she plans to give back to the Indigenous communities and organizations that helped her return to school by doing volunteer tax preparation work for low-income individuals in rural Alaska villages, as well as creating a centralized resource of scholarships available to hopeful Indigenous students like she was.

"Anything worth doing is not easy and is worth doing correctly. It doesn't matter what you have going on in your life, you can go to school if that's something you desire. There's help out there if you don't have the finances or even the familial support, and I want to serve the Indigenous community the same way they helped me and with the degree they got me," she said.

KATIE SCOGGIN

Student Speaker

When political science major and Spanish minor Katie Scoggin first enrolled at UAA in fall 2020 amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, everything was online. Looking for a way to connect with fellow students, she joined the sorority Alpha Sigma Alpha. That first foray into campus life led to more connections and opportunities than she ever imagined.

Scoggin, a Steller Secondary School graduate and UA Scholar who initially planned to attend college in the Lower 48 thinking it'd be "bigger and better" before deciding to stay closer to her family as the pandemic roiled the world, was surprised to find that UAA is "literally dripping with opportunity."

It wasn't long before she took on leadership roles within the sorority and UAA's Panhellenic Council. Thanks to the people she met through her involvement, she seized the opportunity to become a peer health educator with the Student Health and Counseling Center and participate in Model UN. She joined USUAA student government as a delegate for the College of Arts and Sciences and went on to serve as president during her sophomore and junior years. She lived on campus to help make the most of her undergraduate experience, working as a resident advisor since her sophomore year.

Just as her peers helped open her up to new opportunities across campus, she's grateful for the support of faculty, staff and administrators. "They care about who you are as a person, if you're being taken care of, and where you're going," said Scoggin. "They are so invested in your future. I feel like that can't be overstated enough: how much the community cares about everyone in it."

The Honors College student credits faculty and UAA's community ties with helping her land internships with the Alaska Innocence Project and the Alaska Immigration Law Center, as well as a summer job as campaign manager for Alaska House of Representatives candidate Alyse Galvin. In turn, that job connected her with Ship Creek Group, where she'll soon begin a full-time job helping to manage campaigns for Alaska legislative candidates during what's sure to be a pivotal election year.

Looking to the future, Scoggin plans to continue her journey in public service, with aspirations of pursuing an advanced degree in public policy or law. Whether through criminal defense law, immigration advocacy or other avenues, Scoggin hopes to uplift those in need and create positive change in society.

"The most important thing in life is not your academic career or monetary success," said Scoggin. "That is not nearly as rewarding and fulfilling as helping other people and giving back."

ACADEMIC TRADITIONS

Robes, Mortarboards, Hoods

An academic legend tells of a wise old Greek who dressed his students in mason's sackcloth robes with mortarboards because, "Their destiny is to build. Some will build cities, some will build lives – perhaps one of them will build an empire; but all will be builders on the solid foundation of knowledge."

Whether or not the ancient Greek dressed his students in sackcloth and mortarboard, the academic robes worn today by graduates and faculty trace their beginnings to the mid-12th century, when small groups studied under the tutelage of a scholar (often a monk or priest). These students chose to dress in a robe similar to that of their teacher. Through the centuries, this traditional scholarly dress did not change much. Each individual scholar donned special colors, fur and fabrics, as did his students. In contrast to those Old World customs, today's academic robe has a basic organization that allows you to identify even more about the scholar.

Today's scholars are the university faculty. They wear academic robes with colorful hoods reminiscent of the medieval monk's cowl. The size and colors of the hood tell the observer what discipline the scholar pursued and from which college or university he or she graduated.

UAA master's degree graduates will be wearing their hoods today, for they have gone beyond the bachelor's degree to learn more and become scholars. The University of Alaska Anchorage's colors are gold and green, hence these colors on the hood. The velvet trim on the hood signifies the scholar's field.

Some colleges and universities use the soft beret, but the prevailing style of cap is the traditional square mortarboard, decorated with a long tassel. You may notice some faculty wearing a soft beret-style cap.

It does not matter whether the tassel is worn on the left or right of the mortarboard, but it is often customary to change the tassel to the other side after receiving the diploma.

While you may not be able to identify the origins of each specific academic robe and hood appearing in today's commencement ceremony, you can reflect that from the certificate graduate in his black gown to the Doctor of Philosophy, students and professors alike are paying homage to more than 800 years of academic tradition.

University Mace

The grand marshal carries the University of Alaska Anchorage mace in the commencement procession and places it in a stand on the stage during commencement ceremonies to signify the importance of the occasion. The UAA Alumni Association commissioned the mace in 1990 and two talented UAA employees created it. Dr. Vern Oremus, former dean of UAA's previous College of Career and Vocational Education, used a lathe to create the wooden staff and head. Professor of Art Mariano Gonzales designed and produced the sterling silver torch at the top of the mace. The mace symbolizes UAA as a university of distinction and is traditionally entrusted to the faculty in recognition of their critical role in the education of our students.

UNIVERSITY HONORS

Associate and baccalaureate degree students expected to graduate with honors in spring 2024 are wearing a gold honor cord. Throughout the program, they are recognized by the stars next to their names. Honors are indicated as follows:

To be eligible to graduate with honors, associate and baccalaureate degree-seeking students must first earn a cumulative GPA of 3.50 or above in all college work attempted at UAA. A transfer student who is earning an associate degree must complete a minimum of 15 resident credits with academic letter grades to be eligible to graduate with honors. A transfer student who is earning a baccalaureate degree must complete a minimum of 30 resident credits with academic letter grades to be eligible to graduate with honors. All transfer students must have a cumulative GPA of 3.50 or above in all college work attempted both at UAA and at all other accredited institutions attended and for all courses used to fulfill the degree program in order to graduate with honors. At UAA, graduation with honors represents a student's entire academic history. All grades and credits earned will be included in determining eligibility to graduate with honors (Ds, Fs, retaken courses, courses lost in academic bankruptcy, etc.). In addition, a student transferring coursework and grades must have a minimum of 70 percent of their credits submitted with letter grades to be eligible to graduate with honors.
