Rachal had found what he was looking for and used the image that accompanied the story as the first Seawolf logo in 1977.

HONORARY DEGREE AWARD

KYLE HOPKINS

Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters

Born and raised in Alaska, justice-oriented journalist Kyle Hopkins earned his B.A. in journalism and political science from UAF and has since demonstrated exceptional expertise in uncovering critical issues through in-depth reporting.

Hopkins worked at small newspapers across the state before taking a role at the Anchorage Daily News (ADN) as a multimedia reporter, where he wrote breaking daily news and enterprise stories for a decade prior to taking a role with KTUU as an investigative reporter



and digital director. During his tenure at KTUU, he oversaw enterprise reporting and received a national Edward R. Murrow award. He returned to the ADN in 2018 as special projects editor and senior reporter, a position he continues to hold. From 2021-23, Hopkins served as an inaugural member of the ProPublica Distinguished Fellows. He also served as an executive producer and consultant for the ABC television series "Alaska Daily."

In 2020, Kyle and the ADN received the Pulitzer Prize for Public Service for the "Lawless" series exposing Alaska's unjust public safety system in collaboration with ProPublica's Local Reporting Network. In addition to his Pulitzer Prize, Hopkins has received numerous awards for his work, including the National Magazine Award for Community Journalism, the Dart Award for Excellence in Coverage of Trauma and several SPJ Ethics in Journalism Awards.

HONORARY DEGREE AWARD

HEATHER LENDE

Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters

Heather Lende is a distinguished Alaska author and community leader with significant contributions to literature and public service. She earned a B.A. in history from Middlebury College and an M.F.A. in creative writing from UAA. Lende is the author of several bestselling and critically acclaimed memoirs, including *Find the Good, If You Lived Here, I'd Know Your Name,* and *Take Good Care of the Garden and the Dogs.* Her books focus on her experiences and observations in Haines, Alaska.



In addition to her writing, Lende has held various roles within the literary and local community. She had a long running column in the Anchorage Daily News, served as a contributing editor for Woman's Day magazine and wrote approximately 400 obituaries for the Chilkat Valley News. Lende has been recognized with the Alaska Governor's Award for Distinguished Service to the Humanities, the Alaska Center for the Book's Contribution to Literacy Award, the Alaska Library Association's Alaskana Award, numerous Alaska Press Club Awards, and the Episcopal Bishop of Alaska's Bishop's Cross Award. She was the Alaska State Writer Laureate from 2021-24. She has been active with the Center for the Narrative and Lyric Arts and the North Words Writers Symposium.

Lende's past and present community involvement includes volunteering and serving as a board member for Hospice of Haines, the Chilkat Valley Community Foundation, the Haines Borough Public Library and KHNS community radio. Additionally, she volunteered as the Haines High cross-country coach for 17 years and served on the Haines School Board and the Haines Borough Assembly.

MERITORIOUS SERVICE AWARD

MICHAEL HAWFIELD

Meritorious Service Award

Mike Hawfield is a faculty emeritus who retired in May 2016 after eight years as a full-time associate professor and 10 years as an adjunct professor at Kenai Peninsula College. Though the title of emeritus is usually bestowed only on full professors, UAA guidelines allow the honor to be awarded "in exceptional circumstances" for those who "have a record of outstanding service to the academy." Hawfield was found to be one of these exceptional circumstances and awarded the title of emeritus.



Prior to his time at KPC, Hawfield taught at Lynchburg College, Indiana University South Bend, the University of Notre Dame and Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis. Throughout his career, he authored several books and chapters, more than 100 history articles, and book reviews.

Hawfield holds a master's degree in history and has been awarded a number of history-related honors. In 2013, he was appointed by former Governor Parnell to the Alaska State Historical Commission. That same year, the Alaska Historical Society awarded him the 2013 President's Award. Just two years later, the Homer Public Library honored him with its Lifelong Learner Award. He has served on the Homer Hospice Board of Directors, as executive director of Museums Alaska and as director of the Pratt Museum in Homer.

JUDGE MORGAN CHRISTEN

Commencement Speaker Meritorious Service Award

Judge Morgan Christen serves on the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. Prior to her appointment to the federal bench in 2012, Judge Christen served as a Justice of the Alaska Supreme Court and as a Superior Court Judge in Anchorage.

Judge Christen was born and raised in Washington. She traveled abroad extensively in earning her baccalaureate degree from the University of Washington, and holds a Juris

Doctor degree from Golden Gate University School of Law. After law school, Judge Christen joined the firm Preston Gates (now K&L Gates) where she practiced civil litigation. She was appointed to the Superior Court of the State of Alaska in 2002.

Judge Christen has contributed a great deal to Alaska through both her judicial service and as a volunteer in the community. She has served as a mentor, teaching students through Anchorage Youth Court and other civic programs. She served on the boards of the Alaska Community Foundation, Rasmuson Foundation, Anchorage Big Brothers/ Big Sisters and United Way of Anchorage. She has chaired the Pacific Northwest selection committee for the Rhodes Scholarship, and has been an active member of Rotary. Judge Christen received the Light of Hope Award for work on behalf of Alaska's children. She is also a past recipient of the Alaska Supreme Court's Community Outreach Award, the Anchorage Chamber of Commerce Athena Award and the YWCA Women of Achievement Award.

Judge Christen's service to Alaska exemplifies integrity, professionalism and a deep commitment to our state and its communities.



IQLAS DUBED

Student Speaker

Fall 2024 undergraduate student commencement speaker Iqlas Dubed's story is marked by resilience, transformation and a deep commitment to making a difference. Originally from Ethiopia, she immigrated to Anchorage with her family in 2012 as a refugee and has called it home since.

Dubed first enrolled at UAA as an Alaska Middle College student during her sophomore year at Bettye Davis East High School, citing the experience as one of the most unique aspects of

her undergraduate education. The foundation she built through the program gave her the freedom to explore academic interests without immediately choosing a major.

"Instead of taking a complete gap year, I was able to dedicate a full academic year to taking a lighter course load, which allowed me to thoughtfully explore and determine my long-term academic goals without falling behind," said Dubed.

After weighing her options, Dubed decided to pursue a bachelor's in political science with a minor in history, driven by a deep interest in reforming systems of justice and a desire to improve Alaska's legal landscape. "I've always been passionate about law and justice reform, especially in Alaska," she said. In addition to her studies, she credits her involvement with the Civic Engagement Academy and her involvement in the community for giving her valuable handson experience and deepening her understanding of legal systems. She plans to attend law school after graduation with the long-term goal of starting a nonprofit in Alaska focused on criminal justice reform, advocacy for defendants' rights and re-entry programs for formerly incarcerated individuals.

Despite early struggles with finding a sense of community on campus, Dubed became deeply engaged at UAA. She started as a senator for USUAA student government and advanced to Speaker of the Assembly, a pivotal role that helped her overcome her fear of public speaking. Additional public speaking experiences — presenting on a panel at the Alaska Just Transition Summit and speaking at the Spring Alaska Society for Technology in Education Conference — gave her the confidence to apply for the commencement speaker role.

Dubed's particularly grateful for the support system that helped her achieve this milestone: her parents and sisters, UAA faculty members and the peers she met along the way. "Without their support and encouragement, none of what I've accomplished at UAA would have been possible," she said.

Her message to the graduating class is simple but powerful: embrace your unique journey. "Through my own journey from a shy student to an active campus leader, I learned that our greatest strength often lies in our uniqueness," said Dubed. "My message encourages graduates to see their individual stories not as obstacles to overcome but as powerful tools for building bridges, fostering understanding and contributing meaningfully to their communities."



MOHAMED NIAGNE

Graduate Student Speaker*

If there is anything civil engineering and project management alumnus Mohamed Niagne is passionate about, it is support structures – in engineering, and especially in relationships.

During Niagne's time at UAA as an undergrad, fellow students in the Alaska Native Science and Engineering Program (ANSEP) are what made campus feel like home. After graduating, a fellow College of Engineering (CoEng) alumnus referred Niagne to his current position at the Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities where he designs roads. And at



that job, a colleague inspired Niagne to return to UAA to pursue graduate studies in project management.

"My time and the people at UAA were very crucial to helping me understand and appreciate all the work I would be doing," said Niagne. "Now I'm part of society and I believe UAA gave me the best opportunities to make that impact and do that work."

According to Niagne, the project management education supports his civil engineering experience, giving him the organizational skills to be a more efficient engineer. Ultimately, Niagne's goal is to continue using his talents to bring better services, like clean water and energy, to communities around the world while finding safer methods to tap into natural resources.

Born in Côte d'Ivoire, West Africa, and raised in Senegal, West Africa, Niagne and his family moved to Anchorage, Alaska in 2010. Even at a young age, it was apparent that his future lay in engineering.

"My parents hated getting me toys," said Niagne. "I'd play with them for a bit, but my favorite part was breaking them down and putting them back together. They'd get upset, but it was a great learning process. Eventually they stopped getting me toys though."

After enrolling at UAA in 2013, Niagne quickly expanded his support network, serving as vice president of the Greek Council, brother of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, vice president of the American Indian Science and Engineering Society, peer mentor at ANSEP and member of the African American, Hispanic, Asian, International and Native American students program. Even now, he remains heavily involved at his alma mater through his continued work with ANSEP and CoEng.

Niagne credits his enthusiasm for immersing himself in community and improving the world around him to his grandfather. All the traits he aspires to come from watching his grandfather take an active leadership role in Côte d'Ivoire, exhibiting patience, wisdom and optimism.

"If you want change, it has to start with you. My grandfather showed me that," said Niagne. "That wisdom is what inspired me to give back to this town, community and state."

ACADEMIC TRADITIONS

Robes, Mortarboards, Hoods

An academic legend tells of a wise old Greek who dressed his students in mason's sackcloth robes with mortarboards because, "Their destiny is to build. Some will build cities, some will build lives – perhaps one of them will build an empire; but all will be builders on the solid foundation of knowledge."

Whether or not the ancient Greek dressed his students in sackcloth and mortarboard, the academic robes worn today by graduates and faculty trace their beginnings to the mid-12th century, when small groups studied under the tutelage of a scholar (often a monk or priest). These students chose to dress in a robe similar to that of their teacher. Through the centuries, this traditional scholarly dress did not change much. Each individual scholar donned special colors, fur and fabrics, as did his students. In contrast to those Old World customs, today's academic robe has a basic organization that allows you to identify even more about the scholar.

Today's scholars are the university faculty. They wear academic robes with colorful hoods reminiscent of the medieval monk's cowl. The size and colors of the hood tell the observer what discipline the scholar pursued and from which college or university he or she graduated.

UAA master's degree graduates will be wearing their hoods today, for they have gone beyond the bachelor's degree to learn more and become scholars. The University of Alaska Anchorage's colors are gold and green, hence these colors on the hood. The velvet trim on the hood signifies the scholar's field.

Some colleges and universities use the soft beret, but the prevailing style of cap is the traditional square mortarboard, decorated with a long tassel. You may notice some faculty wearing a soft beret-style cap.

It does not matter whether the tassel is worn on the left or right of the mortarboard, but it is often customary to change the tassel to the other side after receiving the diploma.

While you may not be able to identify the origins of each specific academic robe and hood appearing in today's commencement ceremony, you can reflect that from the certificate graduate in his black gown to the Doctor of Philosophy, students and professors alike are paying homage to more than 800 years of academic tradition.

University Mace

The grand marshal carries the University of Alaska Anchorage mace in the commencement procession and places it in a stand on the stage during commencement ceremonies to signify the importance of the occasion. The UAA Alumni Association commissioned the mace in 1990 and two talented UAA employees created it. Dr. Vern Oremus, former dean of UAA's previous College of Career and Vocational Education, used a lathe to create the wooden staff and head. Professor of Art Mariano Gonzales designed and produced the sterling silver torch at the top of the mace. The mace symbolizes UAA as a university of distinction and is traditionally entrusted to the faculty in recognition of their critical role in the education of our students.
